How to Dry Tomatoes

Roma type tomatoes are the best. Wash well. Slice in half, or thirds if big. You can pop out the seed capsules when you slice. No need to peel. Last batch I sliced off the stem end.

Best temperature is about 150F. My dehydrator does not have a thermostat; I put a meat thermometer on a rack to test (and temperature will vary by rack). Place on drying racks, skin down. Segregate the center slice pieces, as these will dry much faster. Wait and watch.

Middle slices are easy to burn (turn black). Commercial instructions say 10-12 hours. Varies with temperature and thickness.

When the slices with skin start curling up, flatten them out and flip over to keep flat.

Storage: If really dry, keep fine in cupboard (dry being still flexible but not mushy). Marginal put in freezer. Use up within 12 months.

Uses: I usually cut up smaller when cooking with these. They are pretty potent (unless you really want that "tomato zap"). Add to lentil soup, chili, bulgur, pot roast. **By**

Recipe of the Month Frieda Bostian's Candied Ginger and Rosemary Squares

1 lb unsalted butter, softened
1 3/4 cups sugar
4 cups all-purpose flour
1 tsp salt
2 large eggs, beaten lightly
1 cup (@5oz) finely chopped crystallized ginger
3 tblsp dried or 1 tblsp fresh chopped rosemary
1 tblsp water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees; grease a 9 x 13 pan.

In large bowl beat together butter and sugar until light and fluffy.

Gradually add flour and salt to butter mixture, then eggs and water and mix well.

Beat in ginger and rosemary and spread dough evenly into pan.

Bake in middle of oven 35-35 minutes or until a tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan on a rack. Cut into small squares. Freezes well. **By Evelyn**

September Garden Chores

The Whole Garden

- *Continue watering your garden as needed during dry weather.
- *Continue collecting seeds for next year's garden.
- *Continue checking regularly for signs of pests and diseases.
- *Continue weeding your beds and garden.
- *Cover water gardens with netting.

Trees and Shrubs

- *Plant roses as well as other trees and shrubs.
- *Cut roses with fall bloom to bring indoors.
- *Water newly planted trees and shrubs once a week.
- *Water established trees and shrubs only in periods of drought.

Flowers and Grasses

- *Cut back ragged-looking perennials.
- *Divide perennials.
- *Divide peonies.
- *Uproot spent annuals and toss them on the compost pile.
- *Sow annuals for bloom next year.
- *Dig tender bulbs when leaves die back.
- *Plant tulips.
- *Move indoors any houseplants that summered outdoors.

Fruits and Vegetables

- *Continue direct-seeding lettuce, endive, escarole, and spinach and any cold hardy plants.
- *Harvest all your basil before frost.
- *Harvest fall raspberries (*Rubus* spp.).
- *Before a hard frost, harvest fava beans.
- *Begin harvesting cold-tolerant vegetables such as Brussels sprouts and kale.

- *Harvest pumpkins and winter squash.
- *Dig up and pot rosemary to overwinter indoors.
- *Clean up areas of the vegetable garden that have finished producing.
